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








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



PROJECT BACKGROUND

Pearman has designed the sculpture, called HAT PIN, to celebrate and respond to the heritage of Luton's Hat industry and broaden public engagement with Luton's stories and spaces. The new commission offers the thousands of daily visitors and residents of Luton arriving from the main station, an optical illusion of a threedimensional hat pin slotted into one of Luton's key heritage buildings, referencing the hat making industry of the past and the creative enterprises of tomorrow.

The jewel-like work is made from the traditional sign-making medium of vitreous enamel and intersects Hat House, formerly the iconic Connor Hat Factory, which has recently been fully renovated into contemporary workspaces for the creative industries.

PROJECT BACKGROUND

Public Artist Tom Pearman, has taken the concept of the rail and tram networks and the idea of 'moving along a line', to create a series of **12 enamel way-finding signs**, together with a large-scale wall artwork which references the rail network colours and symbols. This artwork and signage creates a unique and inspiring identity for the development, development which is situated on the location of the old Addiscombe Station.

Tom has referenced **folding train map pamphlets** for the artwork which was also employed for a flyer distributed to local residents introducing them to the project.



As the appointed artist I will be required to develop an artwork or series of artworks which enhances the setting for the new residential development on the former depot site.









PROJECT BACKGROUND

Funded by the London Mayor's Air Quality Fund, Tom Pearman was commissioned to design a series of enamel signs to be located within the Brockley area, in South London. The locations included a public library, a public house, a station cafe and 3 local schools.


Each artwork has a different positive message on a different opening box that contains 'CLEANER AIR'.

It is hoped through this socially engaged public art scheme and through active public consultation combined with educational art and clean air themed workshops, that the artworks will help foster a collaborative and creative approach towards promoting cleaner air quality.

Tom managed the project in its entirety, establishing relationships with the local authority, relevant community groups and local businesses. He conducted a series of educational programmes in two local schools that informed the designs of the artworks and attended community meetings and public assemblies to gather opinions for the scheme and to inform the public of the project's ambitions and aims.

Tom managed the installation of the artworks at the different locations ensuring that all the sites and the corresponding businesses were informed of all key stages of the scheme. 'Tom was commissioned over a 2 year period and his remit was extended due to the quality of his work. He worked independently and thoroughly over achieving in the positive outcomes to the project. He has fantastic creative and strategic abilities and a project would be safe in his hands.'



PROJECT: Barry Town Centre vitreous enamel public art scheme

Pearman undertook a series of workshops with local schools and youth groups. Using Barry as a backdrop the youngsters enveloped themselves in the creation of a series of stop-frame animation scenes, using a narrative of 'Monsters Invading Barry!'.

The aims of the sessions were to see how we may react to our local environment when a completely foreign element is introduced. Does our local area become a cinematic backdrop for our own imagination?








IDEAS : PEOPLE : PLACES Minecraft consultation programme education

For IDEAS : PEOPLE : PLACES, an arts strategy funded by the Arts Council of Wales. Tom worked with a Holyhead secondary school science department using Minecraft as a platform to design a series of imaginary environments and architectural structures. These structures were devised without practical constraints or limitations, embracing the ideological notion of utopia. A local 3-d printer company was invited to fabricate the student's Minecraft structures.









PROJECT: Stotfold Town Council Offices enamel cladding and glazing commission

Using Typewriter art as an inspiration to include text into the artworks, it enabled a variety of narratives to be introduced as part of a collaborative programme involving six local community groups, schools and members of the public. The graphic imagery of steam and clouds relates to Stotfold's agricultural heritage, and at the same time presents a transient depiction of local memories and stories once told.

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








COLLABORATION In summary I propose to work with target groups in the creation and exploration of underground shelters and explore what would constitute their ideal shelter. What would you want and what would you need to feel secure underground for a period of time? Would you need a full working kitchen and bathroom or would you be happy with something similar to what you have when camping? Books or a TV? Pictures on the wall? A music room? I propose that each participant's drawing or map of their shelter is connected to each other's drawing to make a huge map or plan. Each map / or plan could be linked, similar in a way to how tiled connecting card games are joined. These visuals could be presented on the project website as an online 'mural', and as mentioned above, be accessed through QR codes found on the actual public art. It would also be fantastic if possible to visit Foxenden Quarry with the target group.
