

## Guildford Local Plan Habitats Regulations Assessment update May 2018 Explanation of changes

30 May 2018

## Background

European legislation requires member states to protect important habitats and species. This protection is codified into UK law through domestic legislation including The Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017 (the Habitats Regulations). The Habitats Regulations Assessment (HRA) November 2017 was a core documented submitted for examination with the Local Plan: Strategy and Sites 2017 (the plan) in order to demonstrate that the plan would not lead to adverse effects on the integrity of European protected sites.

The process for assessing the potential effects on European protected sites included a screening stage, where an assessment of whether likely significant effects exist. Following that, an appropriate assessment is undertaken to establish whether adverse effects on the integrity of protected sites would occur.

Following submission of the plan, a European Court of Justice ruling<sup>1</sup> clarified that avoidance and mitigation measures should not be taken into account at the screening stage, but that these should be reserved for the appropriate assessment stage.

The submitted HRA was compliant with the approach as now clarified because avoidance and mitigation measures have been taken into account in the appropriate assessment stage and not used to "screen out" impacts. However, an opportunity was taken to tighten up the wording in the document to make sure this is absolutely clear and to make other minor updates to the wording, resulting in the HRA May 2018.

## Modifications to the Submission Local Plan: Strategy and Sites

As a result of the change in approach to the assessment of impacts under the Habitats Regulations, it is necessary to propose draft modifications to Policy P5: Thames Basin Heaths Special Protection Area of the submission plan. The proposed draft modifications can be seen in the table below.

These developments must be compliant with the Habitats Regulations as a matter of law and must adhere to the principles set out in policy P5. Where avoidance and/or mitigation
	measures are required, these should be provided in line with the approach set out in this policy and the Thames Basin Heaths Special Protection Area Avoidance Strategy (the strategy). The Council will enter into an agreement with anyone undertaking such developments
	to provide avoidance and mitigation measures where appropriate.
